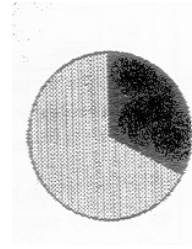

"ICE" Your Phone



The **ICE** concept is not new, it was conceived in 2005. **ICE** stands for

**In Case of
Emergency.**

It is not as widespread as it should be. The idea is to place phone numbers into your cell or landline phone's address book so that emergency workers can contact your next of kin immediately. By using **ICE** as the recognized acronym first responders can quickly identify and contact your next of kin without delay. Mobile phones are the number one target for the system since so many of us carry these devices and when an accident occurs the phone may be close at hand. Many home phones also have built-in directories and this would be useful on these phones as well.

How it works:

You key in under the name:

- 1 ICE – Home** - then key in your home phone number.
- You may want to include other numbers such as
- 2 ICE – Son/Daughter**
- 3 ICE – Sister/Brother**
- 4 ICE – Neighbour etc**

The number in front of ICE should keep these numbers either at the head or the bottom of your directory list.

Your ICE contacts should have good knowledge of your health history and current medications.

It is hoped we never need this system for ourselves, but having it in place may save some precious time and lives.

From Head Office...

At its meeting on February 22-23 2007, the Provincial Executive:

Referred to the May 2007 Senate a motion that \$10,000 be allocated from the Contingency Fund for the purpose of a donation to the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund and that this donation be made at the August 2007 Blue Jays game.

Moved that the painting donated by Harmony Printing be offered to the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund for the purpose of a silent auction.

Note: The Provincial Executive, based on documentation required by the City of Toronto, determined that it was not feasible to raffle the print through a lottery this year and in the future.

Requested that the Communications Committee develop a protocol to deal with electronic communication between the Provincial Office, Districts and individual members.

Approved the electronic processing of RTO/ERO payments for Committee members.

Approved the processing of RTO/ERO membership/advertising fees via credit card. Note: Following one full year of operation, a report regarding electronic processing of payments and fees will be presented to the Provincial Executive for information.

Approved its Priorities for 2007 and requested they be distributed to Committee Chairs and Districts Presidents for feedback prior to the March Executive meeting.

Requested staff to prepare a report on any ramifications/implications of affinity programs being offered to RTO/ERO Districts.

Approved the Client Services Agreement (2007) with Johnson Inc.

Nominated Helen Biales as President of ACER-CART for 2007-2008.

Responded to the Ontario Teachers' Survivor Benefit Group, explaining why RTO/ERO will not take action in the matter re surviving spouses at this time.

Requested a letter be sent to the Courtyard by Marriott Hotel commending its environmental policies with respect to towels, linens and non-smoking, and requesting information on its recycling practices and policies.

Allocated \$2,000 from the Contingency Fund to CAPTR initiatives.

Note: CAPTR is the Coalition After Property Tax Reform, of which RTO/ERO is a member.

Referred proposed amendments to the Constitution and the Bylaw to Senate, dealing with the term of office for Standing Committee members and the speaking order of nominees addressing Senate prior to the election.

Member Biographies -

Jack Baker

(29 Year Member)



Jack Baker ended a wonderful 38 year career in education as Director of Education for the Etobicoke Board of Education and has now been retired for 30 years! Born in 1916, Jack marvels at the many changes he has seen - fondly remembering the first time he heard a radio in 1922; the silent movies that cost 10 cents and the first Ford Model T with foot pedals!

After graduating from Teachers' College, this new graduate had difficulty finding a teaching job, but eventually ended up in Beaverton teaching grades 9-13 with only four other teachers, and earning just \$5 a day or \$25 a week! After a year, he moved to North Bay where he spent 15 years teaching. After three years of teaching, Jack was assigned to be an instructor for the Air Force and did this for three and a half years. In 1955, on what Jack says was his "luckiest day", he came to the Township of Etobicoke as Principal of a school which was about to be called Alderwood Secondary School. Jack was most relieved when the Board, in its wisdom, changed the school designation to Collegiate Institute, so students would attend ACI not ASS! After his retirement in 1977, he worked for five years with Boards of Education and OSSTF dealing with grievances. He has had many wonderful, happy years and is thoroughly enjoying life as a retiree.

Audrey Beagan

Audrey Beagan started teaching in 1940 in Amabale Township, which is north of Owen Sound. From there, she moved and taught in Gormley until 1945. 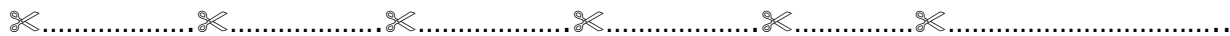
