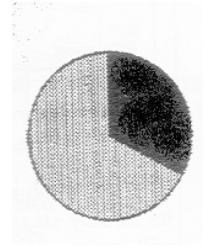

Spring Senate 2007

Whom Can You Trust???

If you can't trust the Provincial Executive Members and the District Elected Senators to uphold the Constitution of this organization - then who will stand up for your rights?

The last senate, in late **May**, was a great disappointment to me. It was particularly difficult for me to understand why the Executive and Senators present would pass a resolution which is in contravention of its own Constitution, even after this conflict was pointed out to the Assembly.

It seems that Health Insurance is the main driving force of this organization and members of a competitive insurance plan have little or no say in the organization.

Usually, if a motion is proposed which has some conflict with the constitution it is often referred to the Executive or a committee for review and the motion is changed to meet the constitutional requirements. This time however they ploughed ahead, passed the motion and effectively formed two classes of Full Membership.

Two motions are directly against Article 5 Rights, Privileges and Responsibilities of Membership. 5.01 (a) which states "the right to hold elected office at the Provincial level and serve on the Provincial Executive, the Senate and Provincial Committees;" The first motion passed with no concern since it seemed to be a directive to the executive and placed the First and Second Vice presidents on the Health Services and Insurance Committee.

The second motion stated "that a member of the Health Services and Insurance Committee must **not** be a member of a competing health insurance plan." I do understand the reasoning for this motion but since it contravenes the right of some members to committee membership, something had to be changed. It was then asked if this means that the Second and First Vice Presidents cannot be members of a competing plan and after some contradictory comments it was decided that the same rule applies.

This may not affect very many members but it does mean that any member of RTO/ERO who is a member of a competing health insurance plan can **not** serve on the Health Services and Insurance Committee nor can they be FIRST or SECOND VICE PRESIDENT thus they cannot be PRESIDENT or PAST PRESIDENT. Those belonging to a competing Health Insurance Plan are effectively second class members restricted in committee membership and being eligible to hold only two of the six executive positions.

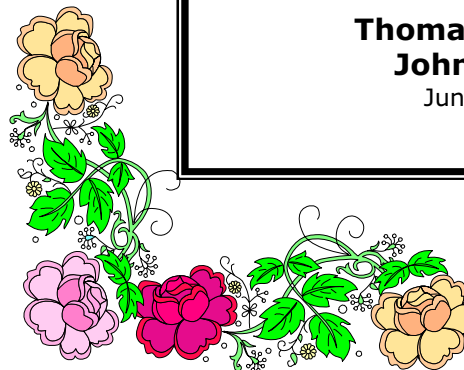

Andrew Bell



Andy Bell began his teaching career in 1942 in a rural school north of Bradford. He then joined the Air Force for two years and when he returned, he was Principal of a four room school in Schomberg. Andy moved to Mimico and taught at John English School. He was the seventh Vice Principal of Vincent Massey and ended his teaching career, retiring from Hollycrest Middle School.

Since retirement, Andy has kept very busy! He has enjoyed travelling in his motor home, exploring North America extensively and spending many winters in Mexico. He started a small business, importing art figurines and selling to art and gift stores. He sold the business in 1986 and has been working part-time for his son as a bookkeeper. He still finds some spare time to golf and read the paper while enjoying a Starbucks coffee!

Catherine Clark



Catherine Clark grew up in New Toronto, attending Mimico High School and then Toronto Normal School. She taught at several schools before her "first" retirement to raise her family. With the 1960s baby boom, the New Toronto School Board called on her to teach again, and as her family was growing up, she accepted. Catherine was a kindergarten teacher who "loved every day" she taught! After many wonderful and fulfilling years, she retired from

teaching at Forest Hill Village School.

Some good advice he received at the time of retirement: "Don't try to teach after you retire....as illness often creeps up on you." Nancy McKillop was reluctant to talk about herself. However, she did tell me that she began her teaching career at Simcoe District High School – and spent six years there where the “kids were fun”. Then she came to Etobicoke C.I. where she taught History and was the librarian of the school. I know from experience that she was an inspiring and firm librarian – she taught us how to write, prepare for and deliver a presentation. As a new student to ECI, I had to do this in front of the class and naturally I was so, so nervous – I actually felt like I would pass out, but in her strict but forceful manner she

encouraged me to continue.

Nancy travelled always during her time off in the summers. In her retirement years she has continued to do a considerable amount of travelling – a five week trip to Africa and a six week trip through Europe.

Georgina taught in the public school system and raised her family at the same time. She has one son who is now 56 years of age. Leonard Turner



Leonard Turner is from Regina, Saskatchewan. He was fortunate to go to Colorado on a Hockey Scholarship then served for three years as an air gunner in the Air Force – 419 Squadron, Moose Squadron. He went from there to Woodstock Secondary School as a Physical Education teacher for six years. After that he moved to Bathurst Heights Collegiate Institute where he taught Physical Education for one year and then became Head of the Phys Ed Department at Downsview Secondary School. After acquiring his Guidance Specialist certificate he then became Vice-Principal at Downsview – where he stayed for 15 years until

he retired in 1981.

Some of his most pleasant memories in teaching were in his years of coaching. In 1952 he felt very proud to take his football team by train to the Red Feather Tournament in Toronto. His team stayed at the King Edward Hotel and played at the old Maple Leaf Stadium. They were accompanied by lots of supporters and the school band – quite an event for a small community. This event was quite an eye-opener – they played four games that night and by observation the winner was declared. He is still in touch with his students – in fact, just recently he spoke to a former student who was playing in the 70 years plus Badminton Tournament at the Boulevard Club. Leonard played tennis until last year – winning the National Championship. He still belongs to the Boulevard Club – goes there for a fitness work out, still plays golf twice a week at the Lakeview and Humber Valley Golf Clubs and goes to his cottage on Echo Lake near Baysville, in the Lake of Bays area. He says he owes his long life to his wife, Vera, who is an excellent cook and has looked after him very well.

Hugh Fullerton



Hugh started his teaching career at Woodstock High School where he taught Grades 6, 7 and 8 for a couple of years. Then he moved to Etobicoke and John English Middle School where he taught Grades 6, 7 and 8 Industrial Arts. He liked it so much that he stayed for 28 years. Hugh particularly liked his Principal, Ken Thorburn.

In his retirement years Hugh has enjoyed cross-country skiing, riding his snowmobile, playing cards and reading.

John Thow

John began teaching at Trinity College, a private school in Port Hope – teaching French and Spanish. Here, some of his students came from South and Central America and



seemed to know more Spanish than he did. He moved to Toronto and taught at Malvern, Bloor and Harbord Collegiates. Then he came to Etobicoke to teach French and German at Burnhamthorpe CI and finally his last stop was at Vincent Massey CI as Head of Moderns where he stayed for 20 years.

On the March breaks he took groups of students (between 45 and 72 at a time) to Paris and Central America where he faced many challenges such as dealing with students who lost their Canadian passports, had medical emergencies, and some who ended up in Mum’s Distillery. Fortunately, all his students made it

home safely.

In his retirement he enjoys his home of 22 years, a condo in Florida where he plays golf, a summer cottage on Kabshe Lake and oversees a lot near Brechin – Bayshore Village.

George Ropchan

George began his teaching career during the depression in the central part of Alberta in a place named Two Hills. He taught in a one room schoolhouse



Grades 1-10 at Gold Creek Public School. Here he was paid his salary by the province not the school board. In order to encourage students to come to school he bought volleyballs and softballs for his students with his own money. In the winter it was so cold that the socks of his students froze to their shoes – he spent his time getting them warmed up. He stayed there one year and then jumped on a freight train headed to Sudbury and the Inco-Nickel Mining Company

Bill Garton



Bill began teaching in East York, joined the RCAF in 1942 and served in Canada and Europe. He returned to his East York position after the war, then transferred to the Toronto staff in 1947. He attended OCE to qualify in English and History. In 1954 he was appointed principal of Rexdale School in Etobicoke, and subsequently was principal of Elmlea, St. George's and Wedgewood Schools. In 1965 he was promoted to area superintendent, then associate superintendent of supervision, and finally to superintendent of supervisory services and

personnel. This position ended when Bill retired. The supervisory responsibilities were assumed by the associate director.

Bill continues to have real respect for the federation executive members with whom he worked. He cannot recall a single instance where a verbal agreement was not honoured or a confidentiality betrayed.

Bill was the staff resource person for negotiations for The Large School Boards of Ontario and a member of the advisory board for the Faculty of Education at York University for several years.

In retirement he keeps busy with the family cottage, cruising to various parts of the world, and trying to learn how to play bridge, golf, snooker and grandfather.

Bruce taught in the City of Toronto where he started in the elementary panel and then moved to secondary. He was Head of Geography at Bloor Collegiate for 20 years.

Highlights of his teaching career were seven 5-day trips with students to New York City to the United Nations sponsored by United Methodists with students in grades 12 and 13. He also took students to baseball games. Even today ex-students he meets comment on how much they enjoyed those trips.

Bruce started the Geography programme at Bloor Collegiate.

He has been retired for 27 years and enjoys being an active member of the Kiwanis Club of Casa Loma and other activities with his wife, Wilma, such as kids planting trees.

Dallas Lyon



Dallas Lyon began his teaching career near Shelburne in a rural one room school with grades 1-9. He moved to another rural school near Dundalk, then to one between Belwood and Grand Valley and later he became the Principal of a three room school in the Village of Grand Valley. From here he moved to Millgrove near Hamilton and taught grades 5-8 and supervised a dozen student teachers every week! Later he was hired in York and taught Industrial Arts at Frank Oak and retired from D. Parsons P.S.

After retirement, he did some supply teaching, and enjoyed the time at home and at the cottage. He has also travelled, especially enjoying many times in Arizona.

1954 – Humber Heights Public School in Etobicoke – teacher of grade 8 – salary increase to \$4,000.00

1955 – Appointed Vice Principal at Park Lawn Public School –

taught grade 8, grade 8 science and taught one year of grade 3

1959 – Moved to Martingrove Public School as V.P.

1962 - Appointed Principal of Millwood Public School

1968 – Moved to Norseman Public School as Principal

1974 – Principal John English Junior Middle School
